Fishing Line Basics

Most lines used in bass fishing are nylon monofilaments, although co-filament, braided and "fused" lines such as "Fireline" are becoming more popular. Buy only "premium" fishing line, which is more uniform and durable. Fishing line can be matched to conditions according to the following criteria: Strength

This is measured in pounds of force required to break the line. Most lines break at a much higher "pound test" than their labels state. "World-record" lines are deigned to break at or just below the labeled pound test.

Abrasion Resistance

For fishing around cover such as rocks or brush, use a line that will not break easily when it is rubbed against the cover.

Diameter

Line diameter affects castabil-



ity, running depths of your lures, stretch and visibility. Thinner lines are harder for fish to see, and they impart a more lifelike action to certain lures such as crankbaits and grubs. Thicker lines are more resistant to abrasion.

Stretch

Lines that stretch somewhat are more "forgiving" and do not break as easily when a fish pulls against them. Low-stretch lines aid in detecting strikes and setting hooks. Stiffness

This quality is closely related to line stretch. A stiff line generally is harder to cast than a flexible line, but it often is more sensitive and continue to the next page

abrasion resistant. Visibility

In clear water, it is important to have line that is not very visible to fish. But when fishing lures on which strikes are likely to be subtle--such as jigs, worms, and grubs--a fluorescent, highly visible line makes it easier to detect line movement that may indicate a strike. Tips on Lines

• Store line in a dark place under moderate temperatures.

• Do not expose line to chemicals such as gasoline, which may cause it to deteriorate.

• While fishing, check frequently for nicks and abrasion by running the last several feet of line between your thumb and fingers.

• Clip off several inches of line and retie to the lure frequently, especially when fishing heavy cover or catching fish.

• If a knot forms in the line, clip off the line above the knot and discard the line.

• Replace the line on each reel when it shows signs of wear. (Buying line in bulk spools will avoid waste of excess line left on "filler" spools.)

• Some use Spiderwire Fusion 12 pound test, and love it. The line is actually only 8 pound test size, so I



How to Spool Line Onto Reels Baitcasting:


Run line through the rod guides and the level-wind device on the reel, then attach to the reel spool with an arbor knot. The line spool should turn as line is fed onto the reel. Hang the line spool vertically on a nail or insert a pencil though the hole in the center of the spool and have someone hold the pencil as line is wound off the spool and onto the reel. Or drop the line spool into water, it will float and the spool will turn as line is wound onto the reel. Add tension to the line by squeezing it between the thumb and a finger as you wind it onto the reel. Fill the reel to within 1/8 inch




of the lip of the spool.



Spinning & Spincast:

Since the reel spool does not rotate, the line spool should not rotate either. Lay the line spool flat on the floor with the label side pointing up. Uncoil line from the line spool and run it through the rod guides and tie to the reel spool with an arbor knot. Add tension to the line with the thumb and a finger as you wind it onto the reel. After 10 or 15 turns of the reel handle, lower the tip to give slack to the line. If the line lays in relatively neat coils, continue filling the reel. If it twists or kinks, turn the line spool over and wind on line. Fill the reel to within 1/8 inch of the lip of the spool.

Deer Applications

Applications for the 2008 Antlerless Deer Season are now available at all West Virginia hunting and fishing license agents, Division of Natural Resources (DNR) District Offices, Elkins Operations Center and Charleston Headquarters, according to Curtis I. Taylor, Chief of the DNR's Wildlife Resources Section. These applications may also be downloaded from the DNR's Web page at www.wvdnr.gov. These limited permit areas provide antlerless deer hunting opportunities in areas of the state where wildlife biologists have determined that limited numbers of antlerless deer permits are necessary to meet management objectives.

Six Wildlife Management Areas (WMAs) will have a limited number of Class N licenses for resident antlerless deer hunting from November 26 through December 13 and December 24 through December 27. Applications must be received by the DNR before the close of business on August 23,





2008. The 2008 limited resident antlerless deer season will provide an opportunity for 650 residents to participate on the six WMAs.





Playing The Fish

Once you've coaxed that bass into striking your lure, it's time to get it into the boat. Here's how to do it. Setting the Hook

Treble-hook lures often cause the bass to hook itself upon striking - often, but not always. The jaws of a bass are tough. It takes a solid impact and a sharp hook point to penetrate.

On crankbaits, when the strike occurs, snap back the rod tip quickly and reel until the line is tight. The impact of the strike often sets the hooks, but by maintaining pressure on the fish you can usually bury them deeper.

With topwaters, it's important to wait a second before setting the hook. An overreaction often results in your pulling the lure from the mouth of the bass.


Single-hook lures (jigs, plastic worms, spinnerbaits) require a strong, deliberate hookset on your part. Often the bass inhales the lure completely. You must drive the hook point home with a solid strike.

DON'T

Tighten down on the fish and then sweep back with the rod tip. This will only turn the head of a big bass.

DO

Set the hook using the slack-line continue to the next page

technique. Upon feeling the strike, turn to face the fish with rod between 10 and 11 o'clock. Then drop the rod top quickly and snap the slack out of the line with a fast overhead strike. This will pound home the hook point the same way a hammer pounds a nail into a board. Always set the hook with a strong upward jerk. However, you don't need to tear the boat seat out of the boat on the hookset. If you're rigged right, the bass will practically hook itself.

Setting the Drag

Your reel's drag allows line slippage. It's a precaution against a big fish or obstacle breaking your line. DON'T

Set the drag by adjusting the drag setting, then pulling line from directly in front to the spool. This can bury line in the spool and gives an inaccurate reading of line pull exerted from the lure.

DO

Adjust the drag and then pull the line from past the rod tip, or tie a heavy object to the end of your line and adjust accordingly. A good rule of thumb is to set the drag to not

exceed half that of the pound test of your line. A spring scale used in weighing fish can help set drag tension more accurately.

Backreeling

Backreeling is a method of playing a fish on a spinning reel that bypass the reel's drag system.

The drag is tightened down and the fisherman uses the reel handle to either take-in or pay-out as the fish demands. With practice, the technique becomes easier, but beginners will find this method difficult to master. The advantage of backreeling is that line twist is often greatly reduced because you aren't reeling while the bass is pulling line against the drag. On light line, you must try to second-guess the bass when backreeling-anticipate its next move - never an easy tack. Landing a Fish

Bass have no teeth, as do many other game fish; therefore they can be easily landed without the use of a net, with practice. Landing nets

may damage fish you wish to release.

Lip-Landing Method

1. When the fish is ready to come in, use the rod to draw it close to the boat. Do not reel up a lot of line. The rod's spring action will act as a shock absorber should the fish decide to make one last run at the boat.

2.Draw the rod back over one shoulder an extend your arm. Maintain pressure on your line. Slowly pull the bass toward your grasp.

3.Carefully press your thumb against the tip of the jaws if the mouth is shut. This will cause it to open. Then firmly clench the lower jaw between thumb and forefinger. 4.On a big bass, wait one second. Put down your rod and use your other hand to grasp the jaw also. 5.Lift the bass aboard.

Net Method

Many bass are lost at the landing net. Net your fish carefully but remember that landing nets will damage the scales, fins and slime coating of a bass.

1.Bring the bass alongside the boat.

2.Put the net into the water, making sure the netting is not tangled.

3.Draw the fish toward the net; the fish will usually swim into it.4.

Scoop the fish up, using a single, smooth motion. Don't try to net the bass downward and do not swipe at a bass that is not ready to come



aboard.

Preventing Problems

• Remember, the harder you fight, the harder the fish fights. Once you pull him from the cover, let up and let the bass tire out before bringing him to the boat.

• If a bass swims under the boat, extend your arms as far as they will go with rod in hand, thereby giving you extra leverage. Maintain pressure and you can usually draw the fish out into the open again. Avoid hitting the trolling motor start button while the bass is under the boat, you can cut your line.

• Don't fight or pull the fish in the continue to the next page

opposite direction it's heading. Turn him by guiding his head.

• Don't panic. Use the tools at hand: your rod, reel, line and brain. Horsing a big fish to the boat usually means losing it.

• Don't try to pull a bass out that's buried in weeds or other heavy cover. You'll usually tear out or straighten the hook. It's wiser to move toward the bass with the boat.

• Long rods are an asset when playing a big fish. They provide more shock-absorbing power, move more line when setting the hook and give you more control over the bass.

• Even a professional fisherman loses some fish. Learn from your mistakes, but don't let them ruin your fishing trip.

• Whatever you do when landing the bass, DO NOT grab the line, especially on a big fish. I have lost a 6 pound largemouth and a 4 pound smallmouth in the last year, because I did not have the patience to wait until the time was right to lip the bass. It is a hard habit to break, but it is worth the effort. -- Joe

• When fishing early in the morning, try using a Yellow Sally on the weed beds and work it fast. I have found this produces a lot of strikes and usually bigger fish. Other popular morning lures are buzzbaits and surface plugs like the Rapala or A.C. Shiner. Other people choose a TIny Torpedo which seems to do real well on rivers like the New or Greenbrier,



Invasive Algae Problem

The invasive algae known as Didymo have been found in the Elk River in the Webster Springs area, according to Bret Preston, Assistant Chief, West Virginia Division of Natural Resources Wildlife Resources Section. Following reports from anglers that heavy algal mats were seen in the Elk River, DNR staff collected samples

GAME CHECKING HUNTING/FISHING LICENSE Gas - Tires - Groceries - Hardware from three locations near Webster Springs. The samples were sent to the Maryland Department of Natural Resources for confirmation. All three samples contained Didymo.

Didymo is a common name for Didymosphenia geminata, a freshwater diatom species that can form extensive mats on stream beds. The thick mats can cover native algae and aquatic insects, and make fishing very difficult. These thick mats appear slimy, but feel more like cotton or wool fabric. The algal mats are also called "rock snot" and can be white, yellow or brown in color. The algae form stalks that attach to rocks. While the algae eventually die and break off, the stalks persist and may impact stream habitats and aquatic organisms for weeks or months.

Its range has expanded and it now can be found in rivers in the western United States and more recently in Maryland, New York, New Hampshire, Pennsylvania and Vermont. It has also been found in three western Virginia rivers (Jackson, Pound and Smith). "In West Virginia, the DNR will work with other state and federal agencies, and anglers to monitor Didymo in the Elk River and other locations," said Preston.

This range expansion is largely attributed to anglers and boaters. Didymo can be attached to waders, paddles and boats. Felt-soled boots and waders are likely the worst culprit in the spread of these algae. The porous material stays damp and the

algae cells can remain alive in the damp felt bottoms. "We encourage anglers to take precautions against moving Didymo and other potential invasive species from one waterbody to another," said Preston. While anglers and boaters may be responsible for the introduction of some unwanted species, they also are the most important line of defense in minimizing the spread of aquatic invasive species by following a few simple steps.

• Before leaving a stream, scrub mud and debris off of boots and fishing gear.

• Disinfect boots and equipment by scrubbing or soaking in 5 percent salt solution (2 cups of salt in 2.5 gallons of water) for one minute and then let dry completely. You

may also scrub equipment with dishwashing detergent and rinse well.

• Allowing equipment to completely dry for at least 48 hours will also kill Didymo, but realize that felt bottoms of boots may require longer drying times.

• Soak items in very hot water (140° F).

Anglers are encouraged to report unusual algal mats that may be Didymo to DNR district offices and the Elkins and Charleston offices.



at the Mobile Delta) at FLW Outdoors-related events.

- MODERATOR COMMENT -Currently, Dudley is ranked fifth overall in the 2008 FLW Tour Angler of the Year race with just one regular-season Tour event remaining. Today, David Dudley is here to take questions from you, the fans. So, without further delay, let's get started.

Q: How does your recent win feel, and what is your next goal?

-- Montae (Lynchburg, S.C.)

A: Anytime you win, it feels good. My next goal would be to win the Bassmaster Classic because that would complete my grand-slam list - I've won a lot of different trails, but that's the one major event I've never won.

- Zam (Omaha, Neb.)

A: Anytime you compete, the better prepared you are for pressure situations. You really learn how to handle different situations, and that helps your fishing. When we get done with our jobs, racquetball really helps take our mind off of fishing for a while and relieve some of the pressure that comes with our sport.

Q: David, great job. On your main hole (at Loudoun-Tellico), was it directly across from a marina? And did current change the way you fished it? Thanks.

-- Kevin Campbell (Knoxville, Tenn.)

A: No, it wasn't across from a marina. Current didn't affect the way I fished it, but it affected the layout of the hole. The reason that spot was so good was that the current cleaned off a certain spot on the ledge. But overall, they didn't pull too much current throughout the tournament.

O: Hey, David, with the dead of summer upon us in the South, what tips can you give on catching larger bass on lakes and reservoirs during the heat of the day? Thanks, and God bless.

-- Trevor (Roanoke, Va.)

A: If you're in areas with a lot of grass, you should go to the thickest



grass you can find. If you're in a lake that doesn't have grass, go to the deepest water you can find. O: What is the most important tip

for a beginning co-angler? -- Jeremy Robertson (Waycross,

Ga.)

A: Pay attention to details. Don't just go out on the water and go through the motions of fishing. Every bite should tell you a story. You should be able to write a one-page report on each bite. Every time you go out there, try to learn something.

Q: What is your favorite deep summertime crankbait? What colors? -- Jason (Bowling Green, Ky.)

A: Probably a Fat-Free Shad in a "sexy shad" color.



map and think an area looks good, it still takes a lot of casts to cover that area you're targeting.

Q: On average, how many hours a week do you spend on the water as you are preparing to fish for a tournament?

-- Russ Nixon (Lynchburg, Va.)

A: It depends on whether it's a shallow-water bite or a deep-water bite. If it's a shallow-water bite, I don't spend as much time practicing because you use your instincts a lot more. If I'm preparing for a deepwater tournament, it's the opposite: I'll stay out from morning to dark, because it takes a lot of time to find the areas that are holding fish. Put it this way, the last FLW Tour event, I was on the water at 6:30 a.m. every day and didn't come in until 9 p.m. every night.

Q: Hello, David. I would like to know if gas prices affected your thoughts of making long runs during practice time or during tournaments. Also, have you tried using All Pro Rods?

-- Scott Towry (Lawrenceburg, Tenn.)

A: Without a doubt, gas prices are in my mind. If I have to run to the back of a creek, I know it's going to

cost me \$10 to check out that spot. But with the level of competition on the FLW Tour, I pretty much block it out, because you can't let factors like that change your decision-making process.

Q: Do you think consistency counts? Some anglers that have been mentioned a lot for this upcoming event, I noticed they have not fished well in the last several tournaments. If you're in a rut, is it hard to get out and start putting together better finishes?

-- Jason (Bowling Green, Ky.)

A: In general, people who get in a rut are usually one-dimensional anglers. So, consistency does count. If you do get in a dry spell, the best way to get out of it is to keep fighting and learn from your mistakes. When you're in a rut, it always helps to get back to the basics. Don't overthink it.

Q: Is the Gulp goby that good of a bait on the Great Lakes, and why does it not work on Southern lakes?

-- Kenneth Shaw (Caledonia, Miss.)



A: The Gulp bait is that good and represents a goby very well. But in the Southern lakes, there aren't any gobies there, so it's not as effective.

Q: I'm fishing the BFL tournaments, and I'm trying to become a pro. Can you give me some good advice?

-- Montae (Lynchburg, S.C.)

A: BFL tournaments are the best training ground there is. So, you're on the right path. As you progress as an angler, you can progress in the level of competitions you enter. you can start to enter Stren Series







Fishing Tube Baits

Tube jigs (like the Fat Gitzit) are excellent for clear water and inactive fish. This lure is used on structure when targeting bass. It's designed to be used as a drop bait, not to swim back or work the bottom. other lures work better for that. It's not a "feel" lure meaning you can give it slack and not worry about a quick hookset because the fish just won't let go. It's usually used in water no deeper than 10 feet deep. Use a spinning reel on a 6-6 1/2foot medium-light to medium action rod for best results. How to Fish Tube Baits

1.Insert a light (1/16 to 1/8 ounce)

lead head jig with a 2/0 hook into the hollow body (push the jig eye through the plastic), cast it on light line and allow it to spiral down to the bass, like a dying baitfish.

2. You must let the bait fall on total slack line for the proper presentation.

3.Let it sit on the bottom, then gently raise your rod tip until you feel the bait. If it feels "funny" (i.e. spongy, weighs a little more or less), set the hook!


4.Lift and drop once or twice, then reel back.


Tips

• A popular rigging method is to use a 2/0 Shaw Grisby High Performance hook or a 2/0 offset shank hook with a (Glider) weight inserted in the body. This weedless rig is best used in cover.

- Use a heavier weight (1/8 1/4 ounce) in vegetation.
- Tighten your drag down for better hooksets, then loosen during the fight.

• Once the fish is away from cover, stop reeling and let the fish tire out. The line and rod will absorb the fight, reducing the risk of line







breakage once the fish gets close to the boat.

• To eliminate loops and knots in your line, manually close the bail continue to the next page

on your reel and pull the line taught in front of the reel. Then reel up loose line.

• When using a tube with a weight, try to use two small bullet-style weights pinched on the line. This will make it fall erratically and the weight will not have to be pegged. -- Anonymous

• Use a worm saver hook and hook the tube near the back legs, giving it a curve. The curve gives the tube a lively action when the rod tip is jerked about 1 foot every 2-3 seconds. -- Madison O'kelley

• When I go for the big ones I use my tube as an extension of the rod and retrieve. Once the worm is down and the line slack, count to 10 and give two easy twitches. This allows the worm to do as it pleases and you're not retrieving line. If there are no hits on the first time, try two more twitches and I guarantee lunkers will fly. -- Johnny Canuck

• Try using Gambler's Florida rig weights. They screw into the tip of the tube and stay put. They also make one that rattles and can be deadly!! I usually use 1/8- to 1/4ounce depending on the cover I am trying to get through. They also make a 1/32-ounce that is great when you want a much slower fall. These work great in winter and very early spring when you need a very slow presentation. -- NM

The West Virginia Division of Natural Resources Wildlife Resources Section will host an Archery in the Schools (AIS) Program training on August 12 and 13 at the Summersville Armory in Summersville, West Virginia, according to Jerry Westfall, Program Coordinator.

"We have tried for some time to arrange AIS training in the central part of the state, and we are happy to have succeeded," said Westfall. "This training will allow area schools to participate in DNR's largest and fastest growing educational program. Since its inception in 2004, more than 30,000 students have been introduced to archery as part of their physical education classes in 140 West Virginia schools. We wanted to show our appreciation to Summersville, which hosted the successful 2008 AIS State Tournament and will be hosting the 2009 AIS State Tournament, by holding this training in Summersville. Of course, since this is a state-wide program, teachers from around the state may participate in any of our trainings."

Teachers interested in attending this free training in Summersville have until July 15 to register. Since classroom size is limited to only 25 teachers and slots are available on a first come, first served basis, teachers are encouraged to register as soon as possible. Also, more than one teacher may consider enrolling from individual schools, especially if schools are interested in having AIS in multiple PE classes and/or after-hours training for tournament competition.

"I encourage all interested educators in the area to sign up and introduce this tremendously popular program to their schools," said Westfall. "As added incentives, the training is free to school employees, and teachers may be eligible



to receive Continuing Education Hours."




